

A Spiritual Healthcheck to start the New Year



Dear Friends,

I am currently reading a book called *Spiritual Healthcheck* which looks at the question, 'How are you doing in your faith?'

So how would you answer that question? How are you doing in your Christian life? Some may be worried when there is no need whilst others are confident when they have no reason to be. Most of us realise that we should be growing as Christians, but aren't always sure what that means exactly, or how to go about it.

Physically, many go to their GP or consultant for some kind of healthcheck where an expert assesses them against several criteria, such as blood pressure, cholesterol, weight, and recommendations may be made in order to become healthy or stay healthy.

The Christian life is the same. We are called to make progress and grow up and stay spiritually healthy. The Apostle John wrote to one of his Christian friends, *Beloved*, *I pray that all may go well with you and that you may be in good health, just as it is well with your soul.* (3 John 1: 2).

But, what is a spiritually healthy Christian? Romans 8: 28-31 says, We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of

his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified. What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us?

To be perfectly spiritually healthy is to be just like Jesus Christ. And to be growing more spiritually healthy is to be growing more like Christ Jesus.

Think about what Jesus was like during his time on earth: Kind. Compassionate. Courageous. Brave. Loyal. Wise. Thoughtful. How do you think you would measure up to these criteria? Is there room for improvement?

1 John 3: 1-2 says, See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. Being spiritually healthy is being just like Christ – but none of us are completely Christ-like and, until Christ returns, we won't be in full spiritual health. The good news is that God is at work to make us more Christ-like – if we are open to change and growth.

If you feel that there are things in your life that you would like to change you may like to pray the following prayer which is adapted from a prayer written by John Newton. John Newton started his career at sea at a young age, and became a Captain of slave ships for several years. After experiencing a period of Christian conversion, Newton eventually renounced his trade, became a prominent supporter of abolitionism, and was ordained as an Anglican cleric, living to see the UK's abolition of the African slave trade in 1807, just before his death. He wrote *Amazing Grace* and *Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken*.

Let us pray:

Lord, I know I am not who I one day will be, but I thank you that I am not who I used to be. Please make me more like Christ today than I was yesterday – and please answer that prayer each day until the day I stand before him. Amen.

In February I will be arranging a new Bible Study course to explore how we can all take steps to live a more spiritually healthy and thriving Christian Life. This will be on a Thursday afternoon. Please look out for further details.

In January, we welcomed around 50 people into St Stephen's Church for Messy Church. Some new families joined us for the first time.


Our theme was David and Goliath and we celebrated how God protects us when we put our trust in him.

Some beautiful crowns were made and worn to remind us that David eventually became king of Israel.




The noticeboard was decorated with the children's artwork of the Philistine soldiers and David's company of sheep.

Revd Hugh Nelson named as the next Bishop of St Germans

Downing Street has announced that the next Bishop of St Germans is to be the Revd Hugh Nelson.

Hugh is currently the parish priest of St Mary's, Goudhurst and Christ Church, Kilndown (known as GK Church), in the Canterbury Diocese.

Prior to his ordination in 2009, Hugh was Director of L'Arche London, a Christian community in which people with and without learning disabilities live together and support one another.

Overseeing growth; pioneering initiatives

As well as overseeing significant growth in his parish churches, Hugh has pioneered new initiatives in Kent,

including a school of theology and a ground-breaking partnership between schools, local churches and a Christian charity to provide counselling to children and support to families.

Hugh chaired the team that developed Canterbury Diocese's strategy, and works on the national Church of England initiatives, *Setting God's People Free and Growing Faith*.

Passionate concern

Hugh brings to the Diocese of Truro and the College of

Bishops a passionate concern for people with learning disabilities; for children, young people and families, particularly those struggling with mental health issues; a deep commitment to ecumenism; first-hand knowledge of the joys and challenges of growing the rural church; and a deep passion to see all people, young and old, in every community, know the life-changing impact of knowing the love of God in Jesus.

He is married to Lizzie, UK director of international peace-building NGO Search for Common Ground, and they have four children.

Hugh said, 'I am honoured and delighted to have

been appointed as the new Bishop of St Germans.'

My joy and privilege

He continued, 'The Christian faith has deep roots in Cornwall, and it will be my joy and privilege as bishop to enable those strong roots to continue to bear fruit today and in the future.


'I look forward to working with all my brothers and sisters in Christ, lay and ordained, in church communities across the diocese, as we live out the hope and love that Jesus has for Cornwall and all its people.'

Welcoming his appointment, the Bishop of Truro, the Rt Revd Philip Mounstephen said, 'I'm delighted to welcome Hugh here as bishop-designate of St Germans

> and we greatly look forward to Hugh, Lizzie and their family joining us later this year.

> 'Hugh has a significant track record of church growth in a rural context; of launching fresh initiatives in mission and ministry, as well as experience of developing strategy at a diocesan level.

'Additionally, he has been deeply shaped by several years working at L'Arche, an intentional Christian community centred around people with profound learning disabilities.'



Deep and joyful call to Cornwall

He continued, 'He speaks of a deep and joyful sense of call to join us in Cornwall. I'm just delighted by his appointment and look forward so much to him joining us here in our adventure of Discovering God's Kingdom; Growing the Church.'

Hugh and his family will move to live in the Diocese of Truro in April. He will be consecrated as a bishop in June, after which he will be formally welcomed to the diocese and will take up his seat in Truro Cathedral.
