



“The wheels on the bus...”

Some of you will know that when I was a youngster I had a great delight in going to the cinema and watching films (as one would do at the cinema). My interest was such that I did seriously ponder on the possibility of becoming a ‘film critic’. (I think considering my background it was more the fact of watching without paying that may have attracted me.) However, it was not to be.

One of the things which fascinated me while watching a film with moving vehicles in it was the way the vehicle went forward while the wheels were appearing to turn in the opposite direction.

Stagecoach, bus, van, train, car, bicycle; it did not

seem to matter as the wheel action was always the same. To my young eyes backwards and forwards at the same time seemed impossible. Of course, later I learnt that it was not magic but an illusion!

November is the month when it would appear that we can achieve the ability to look backward and forward at the same time. In this country we are called to remember; remember those of past generations who were caught up in the struggle and conflict to promote peace. We have to face the fact that humanity has its dark side which brings pain and

suffering both to those who are directly involved in the conflict and to those who wait upon the edges.

The Church also, in this month in particular, bids the Christian family to recall those who are unknown and unseen, but can be remembered for their faith. We pause and evaluate their perseverance that has brought us to this hour, many who lived in far off times

and in distant lands, yet with whom we are one. As we read the accounts of their endeavours and I certainly hope that you do, we can be justly proud that we are one with them.

Some months ago I mentioned my wise old Cornish grandmother with whom I shared the early years of my life. My best memory of her is sitting on the chesterfield in her room with me beside her listening as she recounted stories of her childhood; of her father, especially at the time of General Elections or her mother, the quiet and determined matriarch of a large family and of her brothers and sisters, all older than herself. Often, during such reminiscences, she would recall a particular occasion in her life.

She had a friend who attended the Band of Hope and sometimes she would tag along with her to the junior group gathering. There they learnt the faith

As I remember my Grandmother and her gift to me, I hope that on some future occasion a grandchild of mine (or great-grandchild), will be able to discover stories about me, I pray told with affection. Stories that will make the young lad/lass feel proud to be a member of our family.

Looking back, of course, is not enough. At this time of the year the Church bids us to remember that we are all on a journey forward. Like those of former times, we have a responsibility to carry the message of God's love to the present. To

reveal the love of God who enabled our forebears to stand firm in the faith which has been passed to us so that it may belong to future generations. 'The God who was, who is and will be.'

We are bidden to do this not only by ensuring that the past is not forgotten, but also by the actions in our lives as we share this human experience with others. For the faith is much more than words, it is a faith that demands involvement, a faith that demands we respond in a positive way to ensuring social justice.

Mother's Union



Our Mothers' Union group met in October in St Stephen's Church to enjoy a social afternoon and to welcome new prospective members into the fold.

We began with prayers, led by Sandra, where we especially remembered all those who are sick and suffering. We

know that through God's love they will be comforted.

We then took part in a general knowledge quiz which provided much merriment and the winner was Lorna. We spent some time discussing future plans including ideas for the tree in the Christmas Festival at St Nicholas and St Faith Church at the beginning of December and also arrangements for our Advent service on 14 December.

This November we will be supporting 16 days of activism against gender-based violence. This is an international campaign running between 25 November (International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) and 10 December (International Human Rights Day). Over 187 countries will raise awareness of this issue and call for an end to violence and abuse in all forms.

On 27 November we hope that all Mothers' Union members will wear a purple scarf and gather for a three minute silence at 1.03 pm. We hope that the voices of our four million Mothers' Union members around the world will be heard – calling for action on an international scale. Praying for Peace

I don't know where the time goes. By the time you read this we will be well on the way through November and edging towards Christmas. How time flies by!

We mark the months throughout the year with the that month's particular landmark. We highlight the Christmas festival and New Year and not long after New Year comes Shrove Tuesday and Lent followed by Easter Day. Add to that our own particular days and anniversaries.

Now we have reached the beginning of November, with its times of remembrance. For about 100 years now the beginning of November has had its special days of remembrance with poppies and parades and we pray for Peace and Justice in our world. We remember particularly those who died in two World Wars; to re-establish and maintain Peace. In our prayers we pray for peace and justice in our world and remember those who gave their lives that peace may abound.

The 20th century seems to have been full of wars and our emphasis must be on our prayers for a world at peace. At the beginning of November we concentrate on those prayers of remembrance. That is the peace for which we pray that all the world may enjoy in their daily living and in their relationships with all around them. It begins with us.

The month of November begins by directing us to pray for peace and work for peace, and pray for a world that is at peace with itself.

I know that most of us don't quite believe it, but this search and work for peace really does begin with each of us. It is our prayers and work as individuals that makes that peace a reality. For all this to happen, we have to be at peace with ourselves.
